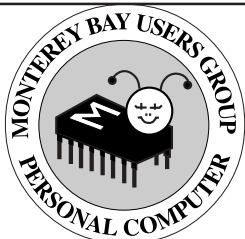

Product Security Notification

Periodically, Microsoft provides notifications about recently discovered security problems in their products. To be informed of these problems, receive "patches" and protect yourself from malicious attacks, you need to subscribe to this service. To subscribe:

1. Send an e-mail to securbas@microsoft.com. The subject line and the message body are not used to process the subscription request, and can be anything you like.
2. You'll get a response asking you to verify the subscription. Send a reply with the word "OK" in the message body (without the quotes).
3. You'll get two e-mails, one saying that you've been added to their list and the other with information on the service and its purpose. You'll receive security notifications whenever they are available. When you get notifications, it is important to read the description and instructions to find out if the security glitch applies to you.

Microsoft's security team investigates issues reported directly to them as well as issues discussed in certain popular security newsgroups. Additional security information is available at <http://www.microsoft.com/technet/security>.

You can cancel your subscription at any time by:

1. Sending an e-mail to securrem@microsoft.com. The subject line and the message body are not used to process the subscription request, and can be anything you like.
2. You'll be asked to verify that you really want to cancel your subscription. Send a reply with the word "OK" (without the quotes) in the message body.
4. You'll receive an e-mail telling you that your name has been removed from the subscriber list.

National Infrastructure Protection Center (NIPC)

The federal government maintains the NIPC web site at www.nipc.gov. It is also very useful for security conscious computer users. NIPC's "Seven Simple Computer Security Tips for Small Business and Home Computer Users" are:

- Use strong passwords. Choose passwords that are difficult or impossible to guess. Give different passwords to all accounts.
- Make regular backups of critical data. Backups must be made at least once each day. Larger organizations should perform a full backup weekly and incremental backups every day. At least once a month the backup media should be verified.
- Use virus protection software. That means three things: having it on your computer in the first place, checking daily for new virus signature updates, and then actually scanning all the files on your computer periodically.
- Use a firewall as a gatekeeper between your computer and the Internet. Firewalls are usually software products. They are essential for those who keep their computers online through the popular DSL and cable modem connections but they are also valuable for those who still dial in.
- Do not keep computers online when not in use. Either shut them off or physically disconnect them from Internet connection.
- Do not open e-mail attachments from strangers, regardless of how enticing the Subject Line or attachment may be. Be suspicious of any unexpected e-mail attachment from someone you do know because it may have been sent without that person's knowledge from an infected machine.
- Regularly download security patches from your software vendors.



“Free” Software: How FREE is “Free”?

We have all downloaded, read and heard of free software, but is it really free? There are five kinds of “free” software:

- **Public Domain Software** This is a program that you can copy freely with no fee. It has no copyright restrictions so you can copy, modify and even sell it.
- **Freeware** This type of free software can be copied and used freely, but it is copyrighted so you cannot sell it.
- **Beta Software** This type is essentially free but comes with strings attached. When a company develops a new program or a new version of an old program, it goes through a period of testing. The first testing phase, called “alpha testing,” is done in-house. During this phase, developers and others use it within their company and make improvements. When it is released in the real world, this is called “beta testing”. During beta testing everyday computer users help find bugs (problems with the program) and report back to the company. A lot of beta testing has been opened to anyone who wants to try a program, but **BEWARE!** While some beta software is stable, others are bug-infested and can have devastating effects on your computer! A good rule of thumb is to stay away from all beta software unless you are experienced at repairing your computer’s inner workings.



FREE SOFTWARE: is it really “free”?

- **Demo Software** A demo program is often a retail-type program like those found in computer stores. Demos are generally fully functioning but only usable for a certain period of time. Sometimes they have disabled features (e.g. a word processing program may seem fully functioning but printing capabilities are disabled, forcing you to purchase the full version if you want to print).
- **Shareware** This is “try before you buy” software: download it from the Internet and if you like it, pay the creator a fee. If you don’t, simply delete the program from your computer. Because software developers have no advertising, shipping, or packaging costs, shareware is relatively inexpensive.

PC to PRINTER with KINKONET

Kinkonet Entanglement

Your friendly copy store, Kinko’s has expanded big time and the results are stunning! Any one can design a publication, get on-line, download some free software and sent their opus to Kinko’s for reproduction ... anywhere in the world (providing there is a Kinko’s close by!)

Monterey Assistant Manager and Technical Coordinator, **Cindy Murphy** and Manager, **Jonathan Porter** discussed all the possibilities of this exciting program at MBUG’s February program.

What Format?

The first consideration for publication/reproduction is: in what format can you produce the data and in what format will the reproducer accept ... to get the best job?

■ **Native** Data in any popular word processing format.

Advantage: Easy to use, comfortable, changes made easily, you are in control.

Disadvantage: Fonts and formatting sizes don't transfer correctly, if at all!

File sizes tend to really expand. The original look of the document is lost.

■ **Post Script (PRN)** Files from Microsoft products

Advantage: Easy way to transport small, highly formatted files that must print exactly the way designed.

Disadvantage: File size increases 300% , the file cannot be edited or viewed on the screen. No change in page layout is allowed. A "ghost printer" must be installed on your home machine in order to use this method of transferring data for reproduction. As an example, Cindy said a three-page PageMaker file will result in 984 pages of Post Script test!

■ **Portable Document Format (PDF)**

Advantage: A small file size that is easily read with Adobe Acrobat (free download). Fonts and formatting remains intact and minor corrections can be made. You can view the document on screen before printing and reduce or enlarge it.

Disadvantage: Since it is not a native file, only minor corrections and typos can be made. It isn't possible to make color corrections on the file, either. Some printers can compensate for this problem.

■ **Kinko's Document Format (KDF)**

Advantage: any Kinko's in the world can print your file exactly as it looks on the screen if you use the KDF format!

Disadvantage: Not many! There is only an IBM/PC version available currently, the Mac people have to wait awhile, but it is coming. Nor can you make color corrections on the file.

Obviously, the KDF format was the important information Kinko's wanted to share with MBUG.

The program is available for free download from <http://www.kinkos.com/print/index.php>, half-way down the page. This was not an intuitive find. Kinko's could do better on page design, I think! Anyway, there it is and it is easy to install following their directions. The KDF installs "Kinko's File Prep Tool" as a printer selection for use when you save a document.

So you can prepare your document with all your formatting,

fonts, graphics etc., save as "Kinko's Document File" and you're ready to send it off to Kinko's.

Send it to Kinko's

Log onto <http://weborder.kinkos.com> and follow their directions IF your file is smaller than 5 MB and place your order, all from the convenience of your home. Information on store locations, maps and other local details are also available, if you want to make a personal contact. Proofs are recommended for high-end photos and graphics. Kinko's makes available free pickup and delivery of your order. Most jobs have a 24-hour turn-around time.

Putting all of these data together, Kinko's are offering a valid tool for reproduction both at home and on the road. A traveling businessman can access this service at any of the worldwide Kinko's stores without any change in format or handling of a KDF file or level of performance.

Thank you, Cindy and Jonathan for providing MBUG-PC with an interesting program. ◆

Norton Anti-Virus 2002

What is the biggest peril to our computers? E-mail attachments and Macros. What is a Macro? A series of menu selections, keystrokes and/or commands that have been recorded and assigned a name or key combination. When the macro name is called or the macro key combination is pressed, the steps in the macro are executed from beginning to end. Also, it can launch a destructive program that replicates itself throughout disk and memory, using up your computer's resources and eventually putting the system down (see [virus](#), [logic bomb](#), [Worm](#), [ExploreZip virus](#) and [Morris worm](#)).

All of the above can get into your computer through incoming e-mail. The tool to ward off attacks is a good anti-virus program. I have used both **McAfee** and **Symantec Norton AntiVirus** and right now I find Norton works best for me. It is also prudent to have a good "firewall", and I find that **ZoneAlarm** provides a large measure of comfort.

However, if you don't **update regularly** you can still fall victim to viruses, so better still, use a program with automatic updates. You'll get messages pop up saying when an update is waiting for you on the web. Click "OK" when you are connected to the 'Net and you'll get a download and installation of the latest "dat" files. Make sure you keep the program alive by paying for the service each year! **ZoneAlarm** is not designed to detect viruses as such, but it will detect irregularities in the structure of incoming messages and file attachments. It will then suggest you examine it carefully and in the meantime it places the message into quarantine.

For most folk the default settings as they come out of the box will suffice. If you wish, you can configure your anti-virus



program by following the settings in the "snapshots". It is not possible to step you through each task in the space provided here, but check the settings in each of the screens below and you will get there! When you install the program, I suggest you place the icon in the system tray. You can then open the program, disable "auto protect" or configure Norton from your system tray. A double left click will open the program. To effect changes, click on "options" where you can change defaults if you wish. Make sure there is a check mark in "enable auto protect" and read the "help" screen for other possible settings. On the left panel you can make changes to "system", "Internet" and "other".

The first screen eventually becomes the status panel after you complete the configuration. Try out the "live update" in the next screen (which can be set to "automatic").



After fixing the "options" and "live update", click on "rescue" to create "rescue disks". These disks will help you to get your computer going if you sustain a major attack and your hard drive gets wiped out or your system is destroyed. Six floppies are needed to do this. Lastly below, on the left side is access to commands that control "system", "Internet" and "other". Use the "help" screen if in doubt, but you will want to make sure that "auto-protect" is enabled. Put check marks and bullets in as indicated. ♦

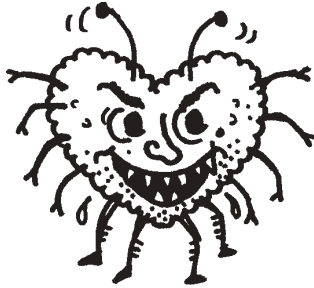


A Very BadTrans Day or “My Funny Valentine”

Of course, it couldn't happen to ME!

Just because I turned off the McAfee Virus scan for a week and just because I didn't download the newest patches, etc. etc. ...sure enough I got a call from **Clive Sanders** just after lunch on Valentine's Day.



“You've got a virus! I'm notifying Listserve to block all mail from you and am alerting RedShift and some other providers that were found in the history of your e-mail to do the same. What are you doing? Where is your virus scan? Mine blocked your mail immediately. You must do something about all of this!”

Humbled by the stupidity of not activating my virus scan, I tried to follow all of Clive's patient directions, ran Scan Disk with no results, while he was bombarded with another 12 messages from my virus! Since I was running XP we weren't exactly sure how it would react so I called **Jeff Smith**, local owner of **Computer Connection** in Pacific Grove and my guru for any and all computer problems, to bail me out.

With the utmost diplomacy, Jeff had me boot the computer in the “safe mode,” by hitting F8 (a lot) while the machine booted up. Once in safe mode, I ran Scan Disk and found System32Kdll.dll was flawed. This virus turned out to be a Trojan named “Hooker”, but Jeff had me run Scan Disk again and this time “W32/BadTrans.eml” and “W32/BadTrans@MM” were detected! That was quite bad. There was no removal tool for “Hooker” which implied that XP and McAfee should handle it. But “BadTrans” was another story.

Jeff went to www.fsecure.com for any information on fixes for “BadTrans”. The site is a compendium of data on all the latest viruses and their best fixes and downloads --- one to definitely keep in your files. Thanks to Jeff, he found the proper fix, sent it over and my machine was declared clean at about five pm. Now I know how Typhoid Mary felt!

Moral of the story: don't believe that you can't catch a virus!

You **can** and it takes a lot of time and a lot of other people's effort to straighten you out. Thanks to both Clive and Jeff! ♦

Error Reading CD-ROM In Drive

If you receive an error message which states “Error Reading CD-ROM In Drive D: (or the letter of your CD-ROM drive); Please Insert CD-ROM XX With Serial Number XX In Drive D”, you were probably reading data from a CD-ROM and you **mistakenly hit the “eject” button**. Your OS is still trying to read that data, so it sends you this error message.



The quick fix is to press the “Esc” key and hope that the program doesn't crash. If it does, you may find your computer is frozen and needs rebooting with the “Reset” or “On/Off” buttons. Sometimes damaged CD-ROMs will cause this message, as well. If that's the case, try cleaning the disc.

Set Default Line Spacing in Word 2000

I often need to use 1.5-line spacing in Word2000. Unfortunately, Word always defaults to single-line spacing. How do I change it? You can set the default line spacing in Normal.dot, the template used for new documents. In Word2000, choose “Tools”, “Options” and click on the “File Locations” tab. Find “User templates” in the list (its folder location will probably be displayed in a useless compressed format such as C:\...\Microsoft\Templates). Double-click on that list item to bring up the “Modify Location” dialog. Most likely you still won't be able to see the entire location, but if you press “Ctrl-C” as soon as the dialog appears, the location will be copied to the Clipboard. Press the “Esc” key twice to close the “Modify Location” and “Options” dialogs. Choose “Open” from the “File” menu; click in the “File name” box, and press “Ctrl-V” to paste the location from the clipboard. You'll find “Normal.dot” in the file list. Open it. Select “Paragraph” from the “Format” menu, choose “1.5 lines” in the “Line spacing:” list, and click on “OK”. From now on, when you create a new document, its line spacing will default to 1.5. ♦

INTERNET, E-MAIL & BEYOND

THE INTERNET, E-MAIL & BEYOND WORKSHOP

Friday, March 15th

This will be the first session in my new workshop series for people who are just getting started in personal computing. We hope to have a high-speed connection (T1) set up and will begin with an overview of e-mail using Outlook Express.

I will then show you how to:

- use a search engine to locate other popular “freeware” and “for purchase” e-mail programs and how to download a program and configure it;

New Horizons PowerPoint Classes

Good Classes, Good Support

There are very good computer classes and support offered in our area. I was fortunate to receive an offer from **New Horizons** for free enrollment in one of their Microsoft computing classes. They offer hundreds, ranging from elementary (PC Introduction, Computers Made Easy) to complex courses (Access, Excel) at their Santa Cruz and Salinas locations. With so many classes, they can accommodate everyone's schedule. Students are a mix of corporate employees and computer aficionados, so the level is definitely professional.

Generally, classes run one to two days, but New Horizons are adding a shorter series to assist in building portfolio skills and job-search techniques (complimentary for current students).

Microsoft PowerPoint 2000, Level 1

I chose the Microsoft PowerPoint 2000, Level 1 class which ran for one day (9am to 4:30pm). They offered an incredible amount of information, certainly more than I could grasp in one session, albeit a full-day! However, the instructor was knowledgeable and patient, no questions were too simple and we all felt fully tutored. We were only seven students, which was ideal (typical classes have 12-15 students). We each had a computer networked to the instructor who worked with a screen and projector. A nifty tool let the teacher tap on the screen and change the position of the cursor!

Our instructor kept our interest through the long day (a slightly long lunch break was welcome). All major chapters in Microsoft's PowerPoint textbook were touched on and thankfully, the text was ours to keep --- it makes a great reference.

New Horizons offers online help for up to two months after each class. During the six months following any course, you can retake the course once plus get tutorial help. Such special attention is making their programs successful. Overall, they have very good classes, worthy of a closer look. Contact them at www.newhorizonscentralcoast.com ♦

The concept works well, except that such honor systems will always have abusers. Some developers give you thirty days to try a program. If you haven't paid your fee after this time, you get gentle reminders via pop-up windows called "nag screens" reminding you to pay. Some programs have built-in mechanisms that completely disable the program if you haven't paid by the end of the trial period. But some will keep on working forever. In this case, **send in your payment!** Honesty is important to keep this system working.

A few of the most popular and reliable sources of free software are: **Tucows** <http://www.tucows.com/> (over 30,000 titles and reviews). **Nonags** <http://nonags.com/> (no nag, no time limit, no disabled features software). **PCWorld** <http://www.pcworld.com/downloads/> (A good collection of nonsense software). ♦
