Answers.com

After installing “Answers” from www.answers.com, when you are working on any document in any program, you can hold down the “Alt” key and click in a word, name or acronym; when you release the “Alt” key a dialog box appears with an explanation of the subject of your query. Or, access “Answers” by clicking on a small icon at the edge of your desktop, typing in a question, and clicking on “Go.” Answers.com offers free access to questions and answers, plus millions of topics from the world’s leading topics from **WordWeb**.

WordWeb.info

This is a comprehensive one-click English thesaurus and dictionary for Windows which can be found at <http://WordWeb.info>. WordWeb can be used to look up words from almost any program, showing definitions, synonyms, and related words. It includes a pronunciation guide and usage examples, and has helpful spelling and “sounds-like” links.

So, you decided to give yourself a new computer over the holidays. Congratulations! By now you will have transferred all important information from your old machine and have decided to donate it to a friend, a worthy charitable organization, or have it responsibly recycled. Congratulations again! But remember, whatever way you decide on to dispose of your old computer, make sure that all information is removed from that old hard drive. Deleting the information does not remove it from your hard drive; it only permits the space to be overwritten (used again).

Eraser is an advanced security tool for Windows, which allows you to completely remove sensitive data from your hard drive by overwriting it several times with carefully selected patterns. Eraser works with **Windows 95, 98, ME, NT, 2000, XP, Vista, Windows 2003 Server** and **DOS**. Eraser is free software and its source code is released under **GNU General Public License** and can be found at www.heidi.ie/node/6.

NOTE: *Keep in mind that Eraser erases everything, including the operating system!*

REPAIRING BROKEN IPODS CHEAPER

Go to www.ipodmods.com to fix your broken **iPod** cheaper. If your iPod isn’t under warranty anymore, **Apple** will charge you quite a bit to fix it, or they will advise you to buy a new one. **IPODmods** will fix your iPod’s battery or screen cheaper than the Apple store.

SEARCH AND YE WILL FIND

There are many search engines available on the Internet: which one do you use? The biggest and most popular are **Google, Yahoo, and MSN**. Each find slightly different “hits” and displays them in a different order. Now, **Jux2** (www.jux2.com) has a way to combine the results from all three of these illustrious search engines in one place for a more comprehensive Internet search tool.

What’s more, each search result will bear the mark of where it ranks on a given search engine’s list (e.g., Google hit #3, Yahoo hit #18, etc.) If you tire of looking at all the results, you can view just the hits from your favorite search engine by clicking on the appropriate tab on the screen. Eureka! I just found it!

Not “A Cup of Java”

Java, produced by **Sun Microsystems** is not dangerous in and of itself, but like any programming language or internet tool it can of course be used for good or evil. **Java** and **Javascript** are unrelated. The fact that they have similar names is unfortunate.

Java is a programming language. All that really means to most folks is simply that when you run an application, the developer who wrote it might have been using Java to create the program.

“... by virtue of having done some surfing on the web you may have downloaded and installed Java.” Programs written in Java are transformed or “compiled” into an intermediate form that when run is interpreted by what’s called a “virtual machine” or VM.

That intermediate form is not machine or platform specific—meaning that as long as there’s a Java virtual machine available for the platform you’re running on, a program written in Java may be able to run on it.

In fact, one of Java’s mottos is “Write Once, Run Anywhere.” (Of course programmers certainly can still write Java programs that work on only specific platforms.) Java Virtual Machines are available for most popular platforms including **Windows**, **Mac** and **Linux**.

Because of its ability to be platform independent, Java is an occasionally popular language for web-based applications or “applets.” When you visit a website that uses a Java applet, you may be prompted to download and install the Java VM, if you don’t already have it, and then the web application can run. Visiting a web site that uses a Java applet is probably how you ended up with Java on your machine.

One of items that occasionally surprises people is that Sun’s implementation of the Java VM will automatically

update it self, much like Windows itself. Suddenly a Sun Java icon might appear in your taskbar’s notification area telling you that a new version is available, or that a new version has been downloaded and installed.

Microsoft is not the only one who tries to confuse all of us: **Outlook** and **Outlook Express** have no relationship to each other; **Hotmail**, **Windows Live Mail**, **Windows Live Hotmail** and **Windows Mail** are *three* different things with *four* different names.

The bottom line is simple that by virtue of having done some surfing on the web you may have downloaded and installed Java. That’s typical, and nothing to be worried about. Similarly, if you periodically see update notifications for the Java VM, that too is to be expected.

MS OUTLOOK TIP (3)

Outlook Today

What do you do first thing in the morning when you open **Microsoft Outlook**? Do you find yourself quickly flipping between the “Inbox,” “Calendar” and “Tasks” to see how your day is shaping up? Would you like a summary of that information instead of flip flopping around to find it?

Go to “View,” “Go To,” and click on “Outlook Today.” In one click you get a summary of your day with calendar listings on the left, tasks in the center and a summary of e-mail message counts on the right.

Obviously, to get to the details you’ll have to start that whole flipping-back-and-forth thing, but if you’re simply looking for a quick summary list, this is a good place to start.

For more information, and to customize Outlook Today, click on the “Assistance” icon and type in: outlook today.

NOVICE CORNER

Enable or Disable Windows Features In Vista

To adjust **Microsoft Vista**’s built-in features, you need to open “Control Panel,” double-click “Programs and Features,” and select “Turn Windows Features On and Off.”

Next, scroll down the list and select or deselect checkboxes for the items you want to enable or disable, respectively. You can also enable or disable sub-features by clicking the plus (+) sign to expand an entry and selecting or deselecting specific subcategories.

Caps Lock, Scroll Lock, Num Lock

Have you ever hit the “Caps Lock” button on your keyboard by mistake and continued typing without noticing it? Would you like to be alerted as soon as you make this mistake?

Here’s the solution: In “Control Panel,” go to “Accessibility Options,” and then to “Keyboard. Check the box for “Use Toggle Keys.” Now you will hear a sound when any of the three keys are depressed. ♦

Bogus E-mail Warning Messages

A newsletter reader sent an e-mail message to me today with a statement that caught my eye: “There was a problem with PayPal. They advised that someone had tried to access my account.” My first reaction is that the notice was bogus. **PayPal** never sends such messages.

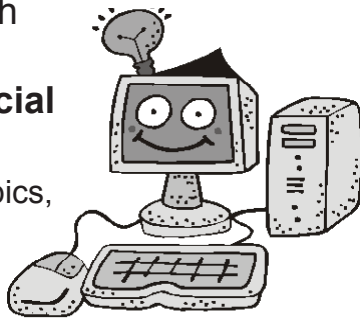
If the “warning” was in the form of an e-mail message, and if that message had a return address of PayPal, the return address probably was forged. The message undoubtedly was not sent by PayPal. It was sent by a rip-off artist trying to gain access to your account. PayPal never sends such messages. Sadly, I have a lot of experience with such messages. My e-mail address is posted in many places on the Internet

and, as a result, I receive 500 to 1,000 spam messages per day. Luckily, my spam filter deletes most of them.

If I take the time to look at these spam messages, I always see dozens of messages per day claiming to be from PayPal or from various banks or credit unions. Many of them claim to be from banks I never heard of, telling me of problems with “my account.” A few of them are even from banks in foreign countries. All of them claim that I need to go to some site or other and enter my user name and password in order to straighten out my account. The excuses vary widely: someone tried to access my account, “foreign” activity, a system crash, a security upgrade was installed on the bank’s or credit union’s server, etc. All of these messages are bogus. Banks and credit unions and PayPal never send such messages.

Return addresses are very easy to forge. In fact, all those messages are sent by rip-off artists and the sites they send me to are not owned or operated by the bank or credit union or by PayPal. The sites are run by the rip-off artists. All the rip-off artists want is for me to enter my real user name and password for that bank or credit union or PayPal so that the rip-off artist can see my account information and then later log in and drain my account. I ignore all such messages. I suggest that you do the same.

If you receive a message from a bank or credit union or from PayPal asking you to go to some site and enter your user name and password, never click on a link in the message. Period.

If you have a question or if you wish to verify the claimed problem, call the bank or credit union or PayPal on the phone. I bet I know what they will tell you but it is even better if you hear it for yourself.

Scam Update: An Online Anti-Virus Scan

On October 17, I wrote an article about some “scareware” that I had encountered online. In short, I described a certain web site that lies to you in an attempt to sell you some worthless anti-virus software. Check to see if

I was pleased to read today that the **Federal Trade Commission** got a court order to at least temporarily halt the “scareware” scheme. According to the FTC, the scheme has tricked more than one million consumers into buying computer security products such as **WinFixer**, **WinAntivirus**, **DriveCleaner**, **ErrorSafe**, and **XP Antivirus**. The court also froze the assets of **Innovative Marketing, Inc.** and **ByteHosting Internet Services, LLC** to preserve the possibility of providing consumers with monetary redress. “...froze the assets...to preserve the possibility of providing consumers with monetary redress...”

Is a \$400 Netbook Useful?

A year ago I published a **Plus Edition** article describing a \$400 “netbook” that I had just purchased. A “netbook” is a new term for a tiny, low-powered laptop computer, usually weighing two pounds or less. These are small computers that are cheaper and lighter than full-scale laptops.

In the year since I purchased mine, I have traveled extensively and have used it to check e-mail from many hotel rooms, airports, and other places. I have written newsletter articles using its built-in word processor and have also created web pages for the eogn.com web site using an HTML editor that I downloaded and installed on the netbook. In short, I have used this two-pound, \$400 netbook to perform almost all the same applications that I typically do with my older \$1,000+ laptop.

To be sure, the tiny netbook does have some significant limitations: a small screen, a small keyboard, and limited storage capacity. However, I find the advantages

outweigh the disadvantages. I especially appreciate being able to slip it into an overcoat pocket when traveling.

I continue to use my tiny computer frequently. So do others. I often see similar computers in use by fellow travelers in airports and elsewhere. Now *The Economist* has written an article that describes not only my netbook, but also a number of similar computers that have appeared in the marketplace in the past twelve months since my article was published.

Quoting from the article: “They typically have screens measuring seven to ten inches diagonally. They have built-in wireless networking, but lack an optical drive for CDs or DVDs. Some use flash memory for storage instead of a hard disk, which makes them more robust and extends battery life. Netbooks generally cost less than \$500. IDC, a market-research firm, reckons worldwide sales of netbooks will reach 10.8m in 2008 and more

than 20m in 2009, during which they will represent 11 to 12 percent of the entire laptop market.”

The article describes several such systems, ranging in price from \$300 (£179 in Britain) up to \$500 (£330) or so. The pictures in the article are all of the **Asus 701 Eee**, the same computer that I wrote about a year ago.

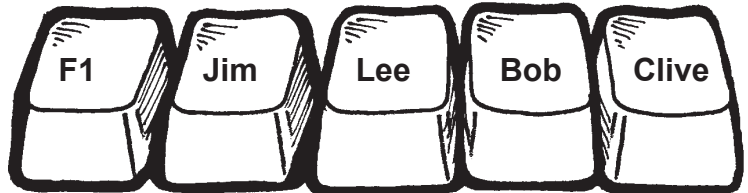

Saving Online

In keeping pace with the state of the economy, and to continue your personal exploration of the Internet, here is a list of money-saving websites. Merchandise offered is not restricted to any one type (such as computer-related), and printing them here does not in any way suggest endorsement by MBUG or any of its affiliates.

Price comparison sites in general compare offers and prices of various vendors. The same goes for coupon and code sites. Local coupon sites usually ask you for your zip code in order to provide more local information. Searching for “coupons,” “price comparison,” “rebates,” and “discount codes,” may yield more money-saving information.

These sites may or may not be current as by their nature they are edited over time—some may disappear while others are added. (Almost) Free Gifts

Editor’s Apologies: This article was submitted well before Christmas, but I failed to get it into the December issue. I therefore submit it here as a valuable year-round gift guide for what looks like economically-challenging times ahead. Whether for a birthday, Valentine’s Day, an anniversary, Easter, Father’s or Mother’s Day, I’m sure the following suggestions will come in handy. RD

Here are some ideas for gifts of lasting value you can create for your family at little to no cost. These are ideas that I have written about and presented at MBUG meetings, but they bear refreshing.

Grow and Share a Family Tree

Download **Standard Legacy Family Tree 7.0** from www.legacyfamilytree.com for FREE. While you are there look at the Video Tour to see some of the things you can do with Legacy. Be aware that some features are only available in the Deluxe edition which is available for \$30 and up. Compared with other genealogy software this is a real bargain for such a powerful program.

Enter as much family history information as you have available. You can always add more later as you uncover it. Enhance your entries with biographical and anecdotal information, and add pictures of individuals from your family photo album.

Print beautiful charts, narratives and/or books with a few clicks and use them for gifts for aunts, uncles, cousins, nieces, nephews, (grown) children, grandparents, grandchildren, etc. I’m sure that many of them will be



very appreciative. You can also save the output as files that you can further process in a word processor such as **Open Office**. Note that the display copy was done 10 years ago and now there are many new features to enhance the output.

Send the charts, etc., by e-mail or post them on a website. **Be careful and considerate of people's privacy, especially living people.** Some family information may be offensive, objectionable or embarrassing to some, but keep it private in your own files for completeness and future reference and do not publish it.

Get started now and have even more information to publish for gifts next Christmas. Although I didn't use Legacy, I have done similar things with other programs so if you have a different one, use it.

Scan Old Journals and Documents

Awhile back I got a faded typewritten copy of several pages of poems that my grandmother had written. Most of us have scanners and they usually come with some version of OCR (Optical Character Recognition) software. This gave me the idea to get those poems into digital format. Due to the faded quality of the copies, I thought this might be somewhat difficult, but I was mistaken. I scanned them and ran them through the OCR and they came out almost perfect. My spell checker found a few places where number 1's and lower case l's had gotten confused, but other than that they were true to the originals. What to do with them next?

I loaded the files into the free **Open Office 1 Suite** (www.openoffice.org) where I was able to do all that I wanted to do with them—rearrange, format, correct a few typos, organize them into a booklet and print the booklet.

Scan Old Photos

The above worked so well that I scanned photos of my grandmother's family from my collection and started adding them to the booklet. Some I mixed in with the poems in appropriate places, and the others went in a photo album addendum at the end of the poems. I used Open Office graphics tools to adjust the quality of the photos to achieve optimum appearance.

I then added various comments and anecdotes in appropriate places, including information from some

of her other writing and I was ready to go to press.

With Open Office I was able to print the pages in a booklet sequence which I then took to **Copy King** and had copies reproduced, including covers, and spiral bound at a very reasonable price. I also made some at home that were simply folded and stapled for an even greater savings.

They made excellent gifts to my immediate family, and when word got around about the booklets, I received more requests. I offered them more copies at my cost and the whole enterprise was very successful. I did this several years ago: newer technology is improved, more versatile, and more elegant.

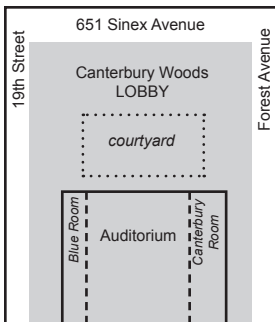

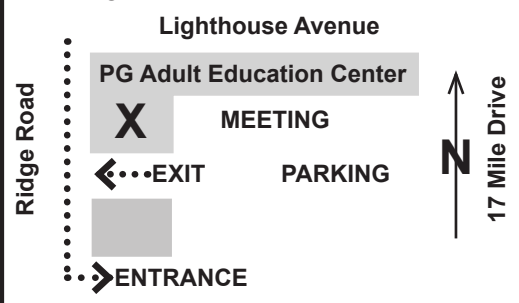

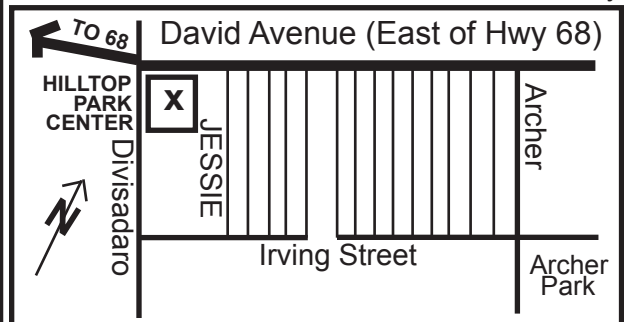
